


School and Community

Since 1951, Myers Park High School has inspired in its students a passion for learning and a commitment to personal integrity and academic excellence. Students are empowered to become self-confident, creative, socially responsible, and globally aware. With a 62-acre campus and 10 individual buildings, students are able to learn in an environment similar to a small college. The campus is centered on a quadrangle, commonly known as the "quad."

Myers Park is a public high school in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg School system. Myers Park utilizes A-day/B-day, 4X4, and hybrid schedules where all students attend four, ninety-minute classes every day. The school mascot is the Mustang. Its official colors are Kelly green and white.

Myers Park is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Myers Park is home to the first public International Baccalaureate® (IB) Diploma Program in North Carolina and first Middle Years Program (MYP) in the US.





The Faculty

Myers Park offers a comprehensive array of support services and resources designed to help all students succeed. The highly-qualified faculty consists of 253 faculty and staff, including: a principal, 4 assistant principals, 3 deans of students, an International Baccalaureate® Diploma Coordinator, 10 counselors, an EC Compliance Coordinator, 2 social workers, a nurse, an Instructional Accountability Coordinator, 3 CTE Career Technical Coordinators, 3 Communities in Schools staff, 2 504 counselors, a media specialist, 2 psychologists and a speech/language pathologist.

Curriculum and Extra-Curricular Programs

Each student is recognized as an individual with an array of interests, talents, and needs. Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate® (IB), and Honors courses are offered in most academic areas. General courses and remedial instruction also are available. In addition, the curriculum provides broad vocational offerings, including Career/Technical Education, an Occupational Diploma, apprenticeships, career intern programs, and the Occupational Course of Study for Exceptional Education students. Art, photography, chorus, theatre arts, orchestra, marching band, debate, journalism, culinary arts, and JROTC are strong components of Myers Park's curriculum.

Academic excellence, athletic development, community service, and creative pursuits come together to strengthen the whole student.

- The campus boasts over 85 clubs that serve as charity and student interest organizations.
- 10 Academic clubs participate in the statewide Scholastic Cup annual competitions.
- Myers Park regularly finishes first in the district in Scholastic Cup standings and in the top three statewide, and have won the State Championship distinction five times in the ten year history of the organization.
- Myers Park supports 31 junior varsity and varsity sports for men and women.
- About 20% student body participates in the athletic program.
- 14 Conference Championships and two State Championships were won last year.
- Myers Park earned second place in the Wells Fargo State Cup for 4A schools.
- 12 students participated in the International Thespian Society Regional Festival; 5 students earned a rating of Excellent or Superior at Regionals and two of those students qualified for Nationals
- Myers Park Art Showcase team was the State Champions in the NCASA Art Showcase with 3 students who were individual state champions.
- 17 students won a Scholastic Art Award; 14 pieces won Honorable Mention, 5 won a Silver Key & 5 won a Gold Key

Class Rank/Grade Point Average

- A student's end-of-year weighted GPA is calculated at the end of grades 9 through 12, using final grades.
- Quality points are assigned on the following scale: A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1, F=0. Beginning in 2015-2016, students receive an additional .5 quality point for Honors and IBMYP courses (except IBMYP Art, IBMYP Drama, IBMYP P.E., and level II IBMYP foreign languages). AP, IB, and Career and College Promise (CPCC dual enrollment) courses receive a 1.0 additional quality point.
- GPA is determined by dividing the total number of quality points earned by the total number of classes taken in grades 9-12.
- Class rank is a ranking of the GPAs in numerical order.
- The GPA uses the semester grade as an interim grade for GPA purposes only.

NOTE: Grading during Spring 2020

When COVID hit our country, Charlotte Mecklenburg Schools began educating all students virtually March 16, 2020. At the end of the second semester, students could elect to receive a traditional *numeric grade*, a *WC* for withdrawal from the course and no credit was earned or a *PC* for passing and credit was earned. For year long courses in the 2019-2020 year, students earned two grades per course, one which was the numeric grade earned prior to COVID and another which was the numeric grade earned after COVID. Each of these grades were for .5 credit.

Advance Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate® (IB)

The International Baccalaureate® Program is a rigorous, two-year comprehensive curriculum for grades eleven and twelve, that seeks to prepare students for post-secondary study. To receive the IB Diploma, students must successfully take one course from each of six subject groups, three courses at Standard Level (one- or two-year courses) and three courses at Higher Level (two-year courses). Additionally, IB students complete a two-year course in Theory of Knowledge, participate in Creativity, Action, and Service activities, and write an Extended Essay of 4,000 words. The Extended Essay gives students an opportunity to conduct an in-depth study of a topic of special interest.

Myers Park offers 26 Advanced Placement (AP) courses and 37 International Baccalaureate® (IB) courses. Any student can take an AP course or enroll in the IB Diploma Program as long as he or she has met any prerequisites and feels capable of completing the level of academic performance required.

Research demonstrates that the best predictors of college graduation are not good high-school grades or test scores, but whether or not a student had an intense academic experience in high school. AP and IB courses offer students the opportunity to tackle college-level academics while still in high school. AP exams meet national standards; IB exams meet international standards. With 26 AP courses and 37 IB courses to choose from, Myers Park students are able to explore their interests, discover new passions, and acquire the skills and habits needed to be successful in college.


IB DIPLOMA RESULTS 2021


For 30 years, Myers Park has been rated among the best International Baccalaureate® Programs in the world. Program participation has grown from 54 students to approximately 26% of the school population.

Due to COVID, IB students did not take IB exams but rather received exam scores based on the Internal Assessment grades given by IBO and teacher predicted grades.

*209 students of the class of 2021were IB Diploma candidates, and 110 of them earned their IB Diploma

*143 students of the class of 2022 are IB Diploma candidates
